Project Description: Request approval to complete the design, bid and award of projects for the purpose of the renovation of the Chemistry, Pharmacy, and Physics Building West Wing. Request approval to enter into the 2017 State System Master Lease Purchase Real Property Program, and request approval of Bond Reimbursement Resolution.

This 92,000 sf building was originally built in 1962 and is used for classrooms and faculty offices; the east wing was renovated in 2003. The final phase of this total building renovation is the west wing. This project would renovate the west wing which includes 12,000 sf of faculty offices spanning three floors. Renovations would include safety issues such as asbestos removal, life safety requirements

and upgrades to energy efficient mechanical and electrical systems.

Requested fund approval: \$2,000,000

<u>Funding Source</u>: State System Master Lease Purchase Real Property Program borrowings of \$1,800,000

<u>Budget Breakdown</u>: Construction \$1,600,000, Architectural and other fees \$150,000; furniture and contingency \$250,000

# B. SYSTEM ADVANCEMENT COMMITTEE—Chair Regent Susan Winchester

Legislative update.

Regent Winchester reported that the legislature is in session and that she is tracking 86 house and senate bills related to higher education. Of those that were scheduled for a hearing, four were presented and four were laid over for next week. Senate Bill 78 authored by Senator Stanislawski, which would expand concurrent enrollment, has passed out of committee and has been referred to the Senate Appropriations and Budget Committee for consideration. House Bill 2323 which is the open carry bill, has been amended to clarify that open carry would not apply to campuses, businesses, parks or recreational areas. Senate Bill 71 would require the State Auditor to audit the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.

Regent Winchester reported that there is nearly a billion dollar shortfall in the budget. Lt. Governor Todd Lamb has withdrawn from the Governor's cabinet and there are nine house members and five senate members who endorsed his opposition to raising taxes.

2. Discussion and update on survey by Anglin & Associates to develop key messages.

Regent Winchester reported that the Anglin & Associates survey has been sent out. There has been very little response. It was sent to 36 legislators, opened by nine, responded to by three. It was also sent to six university presidents, opened by four, one responded to by one. The survey was also sent to eight university officials and it was opened by five and responded to by two people. The numbers go down from there. A request was made to open and respond to the survey.

3. Report on Higher Education Day.

Regent Winchester reported that Higher Education Day at the State Capitol went very well. Regents Ford, Reilly, and Stansberry were present. It was well attended. Students went in groups to talk to legislators and legislators responded that the budget is the focus and that it would be a tough year.

Regent Dunn reported that there is a pretty divisive split among the state, Oklahoma City, and Tulsa chambers on how to address budget issues.

4. Update on RUSO newsletter.

Regent Winchester reported that Anglin & Associates are working on the next RUSO newsletter and requested that if universities have articles or information they want to share to please send that information to the RUSO Office.

#### C. PERSONNEL COMMITTEE REPORT

 OKHEEI Self Insurance update—Whitney Popchoke, RUSO Benefits Coordinator.

Ms. Popchoke presented an update regarding the 2017 benefits as well as the transition to self-funding for medical claims.

On January 1, 2017, OKHEEI became self-insured as a group. There is not a lot of comparative information to date, however, In January 2016 claims totaled \$2,719,984, and in January 2017, claims totaled \$1,356,174.

Ms. Popchoke also provided a short presentation on the use of the Zero Card, a benefit that is provided to all OKHEEI members to assist in cost reduction for routine medical maintenance care and some pharmacy benefits. It is estimated to save over \$1 million in 2017.

There were some concerns that the Zero Card, while beneficial for employees, might drive away business from rural healthcare and pharmacy providers. Ms. Popchoke reported that Zero Card is willing to partner with rural providers to reduce costs.

Ms. Popchoke also reported that there has been positive feedback about the Zero Card from employees.

#### E. PENSION COMMITTEE REPORT—Jessica Kilby

Overview of Pension Committee responsibilities.

Ms. Kilby reported that the Pension Committee provides oversight for the SRA plan, the 403(b) and the 457(b) plans. Not every institution offers the 457(b) plan. The 403(b) and the 457(b) plans are deferred compensation plans. The participants in the plans direct their own investments. There is a menu of investment options. The plan participant bears the risk of investing and potential loss of money put into the plan. Employees are free to enroll month-to-month at any time and can change their investments and how much they invest.

Ms. Kilby also reported that the role of the Pension Committee is primarily financial oversight. The Committee 1) reports back to the board regarding the administration of investment management of these plans; 2) selects and monitors vendors who provide the services on behalf of the plans; 3) develops policies and procedures for plans; 4) selects and monitors investment options offered under the plans, and makes an annual report to the board regarding the performance of investments under those plans.

The Committee also issues the Request for Proposal for investment advisory services. Currently USI Consulting Group is the advisory firm and VOYA is the plan consultant. The Pension Committee meets quarterly with USI to monitor the group of investments and to determine which investments are offered and which are dropped from the plans. USI does the benchmarking, helps to write the investment policy, makes sure we have a good range of assets, help with the RFP for the plan consultant, and ongoing management of asset portfolio. VOYA, the plan administrator, meets on campus with

plan participants, manages funds, manages loans against funds, does periodic review of plans and administer the loans.

2. Request approval to revise Pension Committee Charter.

Regent Reilly made the motion, seconded by Regent Ford, to table the revision to the Pension Committee Charter until the next meeting.

Regent Stansberry made the motion, seconded by Regent Reilly, to approve the President's Recommendations for East Central University as presented by President John Hargrave.

<u>Voting for the motion:</u> Regents Winchester, Dunn, Carpenter, Reilly, Ford, and Stansberry

#### Voting against the motion: none

President Hargrave reported that this is his last meeting before he retires on March 1, 2017. He thanked the board for the opportunity to

serve as the President of ECU and thanked his colleagues. He also thanked Dr. Katricia Pierson and Jessica Kilby for being on the executive team and that they have done a great job particularly in regard to the budget.

President Hargrave introduced Peggy Saunkeah as the Executive Assistant to the President since August 2016. She will be the assistant to the new president.

President Hargrave reported that there was not a campus update to handout due to the number of activities planned on campus for his departure. He also reported being very proud of the students, faculty, and staff at ECU.

Regent Reilly commented that she really enjoyed ECU at the Thunder game.

President Hargrave reported that the ECU Chorale will be singing the National Anthem at the game on February 23, 2017.

President Hargrave also reported that the ECU students are hosting an event called Pack the Gym for Johnny Bob where all are invited to attend.

#### **B. UNIVERSITY OF CENTRAL OKLAHOMA**

(See attachment D, pages 63-74)

Regent Stansberry made the motion, seconded by Regent Winchester, to approve the President's Recommendations for the University of Central Oklahoma as presented by President Don Betz.

Regent Dunn commented on an IT purchase in the President's Recommendations and asked President Betz to explain and identify potential collaboration with other universities. President Betz reported that the request is to enhance current data analytics. The data drawn from those analytics are used to help effective decision-making. It is an institution-wide initiative which builds on Blackboard analytics. They may opt to add more modules or may choose another vendor. UCO is asking for approval to explore the options. There may be something in this investigation that may be fruitful for other institutions and they are more than ready to share any information with the other institutions. UCO has been working on this project for the last five years with Blackboard and Pyramid. UCO may need more sophisticated technology. The analytics affect academic affairs, student affairs, and

information technology. Data analytics are a very active part of the American Council on Education agenda.

Regent Dunn noted that this a \$500,000 project and institutions should collaborate and share resources at every opportunity.

Recognizing President Hargrave's retirement, President Betz said that President Hargrave was exactly the kind of colleague a president hopes for—someone who is authentic and cares deeply and passionately about the institution, and someone who fully exchanges ideas and information. He will miss President Hargrave personally.

President Betz reported that five mass communication students placed second in the national EdVenture Partners Peer to Peer: Challenging Extremism Competition sponsored by Facebook and the Department of Homeland Security in Washington, D.C. The students created the uDefy project in an effort to confront extremism through social media. The team won a \$3,000 scholarship on behalf of UCO for their second place finish.

President Betz reported that 18 years ago UCO started the Endeavor Games for disabled athletes. It has become a national trademark. UCO will now be collaborating with Turnstone, a not-for-profit organization providing therapeutic, educational, wellness, and recreational programs to empower people with disabilities throughout northwestern Indiana to bring the Endeavor Games to Fort Wayne, Indiana April 21-23, 2017. UCO will follow up with their games in the summer.

President Betz reported that last week, The Military Times listed UCO as their number eight pick in the country of all universities that pay particular attention to veterans and their spouses.

President Betz reported that UCO's College of Mathematics and Science broke ground on the UCO Interdisciplinary STEM Teaching and Research Center. Regents Winchester and Stansberry joined the brief ceremony. The facility will enhance the Forensic Science Institute and undergraduate research work. It is expected to come online late summer of 2018.

President Betz reported that the iconic Old North, which was first opened on January 12, 1893, will be reopened to the public on February 22, 2017 after an extensive 17-year remodeling process.

Regent Dunn asked for UCO's data analytics request for proposal to include a reference to UCO being part of a system and for the proposers

to reference their ability to extend their services to sister institutions as needed.

#### C. SOUTHWESTERN OKLAHOMA STATE UNIVERSITY

Regent Stansberry made the motion, seconded by Regent Reilly, to approve the President's Recommendations for Southwestern Oklahoma State University as presented by President Randy Beutler.

<u>Voting for the motion:</u> Regents Winchester, Dunn, Carpenter, Reilly, Ford, and Stansberry

#### Voting against the motion: none

President Beutler reported that he will miss working with President Hargrave and wished him well on his endeavors.

President Beutler reported that on February 18, 2017, SWOSU will be hosting a robotics competition on campus. The competition is hosted by SWOSU's Engineering and Technology school. Thirty-six schools come to compete and the winner will go to the Super Regional Competition in Georgia in March.

President Beutler reported that he would send reminders to the Regents about the President's Leadership Class Banquet on April 10, 2017 on SWOSU's campus.

President Beutler reported that SWOSU has a great alumni base. He reported that a very successful real estate alumni of SWOSU who grew up in Carnegie, Oklahoma identified a cause that means a lot to him, the Bulldog Angels Fund. Often students are one incident away from not completing school, i.e. a broken down vehicle or medical emergency. This alumni established the Bulldog Angels Fund for students who face financial emergencies. The alumni has raised tens of thousands of dollars for this fund. On April 27, 2017 there will be a fundraiser and silent auction for this fund at the Petroleum Club in Oklahoma City. All proceeds will go to the Bulldog Angels Fund.

#### D. NORTHWESTERN OKLAHOMA STATE UNIVERSITY

(See attachment F, pages 77-82)

Regent Ford made the motion, seconded by Regent Reilly, to approve the President's Recommendations for Northwestern Oklahoma State University as presented by President Janet Cunningham.

<u>Voting for the motion:</u> Regents Winchester, Dunn, Carpenter, Reilly, Ford, and Stansberry

#### Voting against the motion: none

President Cunningham reported that she will miss President Hargrave after his retirement.

President Cunningham reported that Jim Holder of Share Trust has passed away at 90 years old. He was instrumental in getting the press box, field turf, and wellness center (which is named after him) up and running. He was the first endowed chair from Share Trust and also supported the Doctor of Nursing Program in a great way. His son Todd, will be moving into his Share Trust position and NWOSU is hoping to continue their strong relationship.

President Cunningham reported that a grant from the State Regents as part of its Oklahoma Teachers Connection, has allowed NWOSU to start a Teach Oklahoma program which targets high school juniors and seniors. Students from Enid and Woodward High School teamed with education students from NWOSU so that they could encourage them to consider the teaching profession as a career choice. The hands-on curriculum includes observation, exploration in all areas of teaching, and teaching exercises in a professional setting.

President Cunningham reported that NWOSU is hosting Oklahoma Research Day in Enid at the Central National Bank Center on March 3, 2017. Close to a 1,000 participants have registered for the event.

#### E. NORTHEASTERN STATE UNIVERSITY

(See attachment G, Pages 83-84)

Regent Ford made the motion, seconded by Regent Stansberry, to approve the President's Recommendations for Northeastern State University as presented by President Steve Turner.

<u>Voting for the motion:</u> Regents Winchester, Dunn, Carpenter, Reilly, Ford, and Stansberry

#### Voting against the motion: none

President Turner congratulated President Hargrave for his accomplishments at ECU. As a fourth-generation Ada resident, President Turner thanked President Hargrave for taking care of the institution and restoring relationships across the community. President Hargrave has been exactly what Ada needed and has served the university and the community well.

President Turner reported that NSU is the only education program in the US that requires all teacher candidates to complete a robotics module in an emerging technology class.

President-Turner reported that on February 15, 2017, Ed Davis, a former police commissioner during the Boston Marathon Bombings, came to NSU's campus as part of the Larry Adair Lectureship Series. The lecture focused on "Law Enforcement in Our Communities: Challenges, Opportunities, and Predictions. It was the largest lecture since President Turner has been at NSU. Friends and family of the former Oklahoma Speaker of the House established the series in 2004 with the goal of raising student interest in public affairs and inspiring the NSU community to become more engaged citizens.

President Turner reported that NSU Associate Professor Dr. Bradley Montgomery-Anderson was awarded with the Linguistic Society of America's Leonard Bloomfield Book Award for 2017 for his work "Cherokee Reference Grammar". It is an ultimate award for a faculty member and author.

President Turner reported that the College of Optometry is preparing to go to Honduras for mission work to see a number of patients. They have have been doing their own fundraising for the trip.

President Turner reported that the NSU changed its approach to Higher Education Day. In the room they reserved, they met with 19 house and senate members. It was very engaging and students shared their thoughts with them.

President Turner reported that every two years there is a cabinet retreat to review what accomplishments have been made from the strategic plan. He thanked the cabinet for their work and said that they will continue to evaluate the plan.

President Turner invited everyone to the Centurion Luncheon scheduled for March 6, 2017.

## F. SOUTHEASTERN OKLAHOMA STATE UNIVERSITY

Regent Ford made the motion, seconded by Regent Stansberry, to approve the President's Recommendations for Southeastern Oklahoma State University as presented by President Sean Burrage.

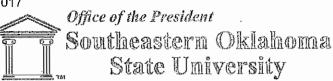

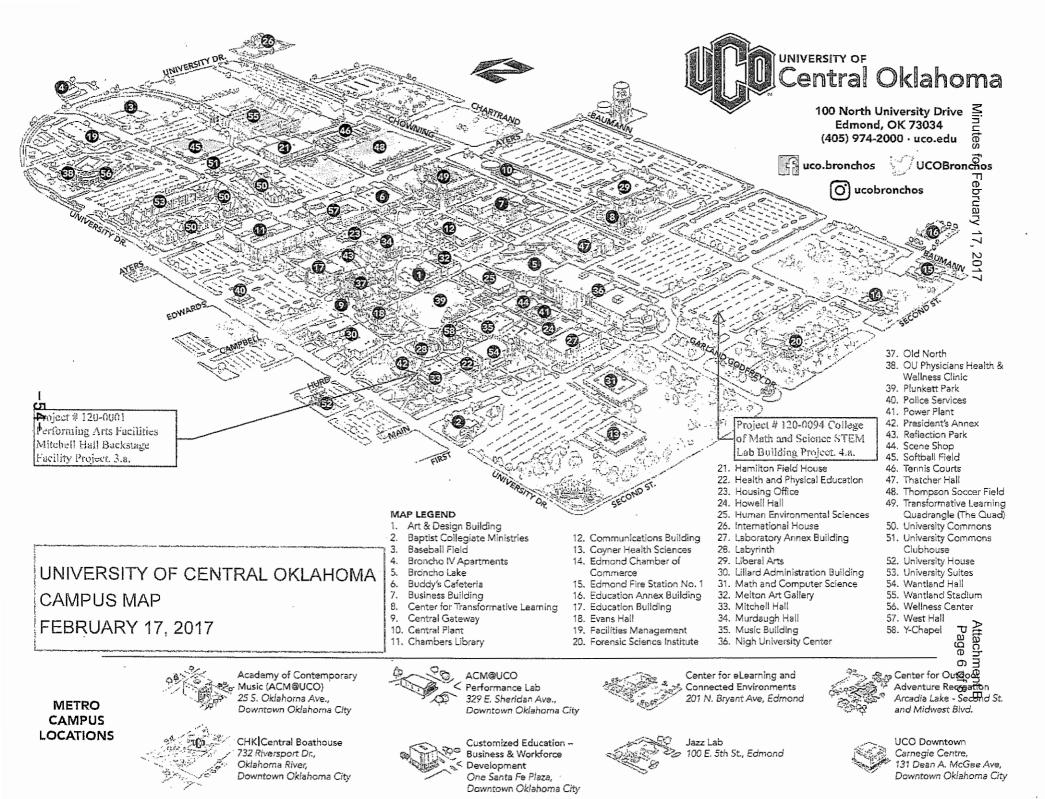

**DR. DOUGLAS BRYHAN** has been named Assistant Professor of Physics for the 2017 - 2018 academic year effective August 9, 2017. This is a tenure track appointment with an academic salary of \$57,000. Dr. Bryhan's position was created in July 2016 to meet the needs of the growing number of physics and engineering majors.

Dr. Bryhan earned his Doctor of Philosophy in chemistry (2007), a Master of Science in physics (2001) and a Bachelor of Science in physics and in mathematics (1995), all from Northern Illinois University. He also has an associate of applied science in computer science from Rock Valley Community College (1991).

Since 2007, Dr. Bryhan has served as an assistant professor at the University of Arkansas at Fort Smith teaching physics, engineering, and chemistry courses. At UAFS, he worked extensively with undergraduate students on research covering nuclear safety and long term health effects of radiation as well as high temperature crystal synthesis. Dr. Bryhan has published in international journals and presented at national conferences. With his education and experience spanning both chemistry and physics disciplines, he will be an asset to the physics program.

**DR. KATHERINE H. LANG** has been appointed Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Social Sciences and as Professor of History, with full tenure, effective July 1, 2017. Her salary for the twelve-month appointment will be \$102,000.

Dr. Lang earned a Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Chicago in Near Eastern Languages and Civillizations (1997) and a Bachelor of Science in Foreigh Service from Gerogetown University in Comparative and Regional Studies (1983). Her areas of scholarship include Medieval Islamic history, Arabic language, and Persian literature.

Dr. Lang has served for nine years as chair of the history department at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire and as interim chair of the psychology department for two years. For the past six years, she has also served as the academic director for the Bachelor of Professional Studies in Organizational Leadership and Communication, UW-EC's online degree completion program that she developed. She has managed enrollment, facilitated student progress toward degree, collaborated with internal and external stakeholders, developed and led faculty.

Addtionally, Dr. Lang has experience building laboratory space for research and overseeing graduate programs. She has significant publications and grant writing experience which include primary investigator on grants that cover humanities faculty traning, history in public places, library collection development, international student and faculty exchanges, and conducting research on Yemen. Highlights of her professional experience include establishing a center for history teaching and learning, collaboarating with universities in the United Kingdom for sharing students and faculty, developing two international immersion courses, and establishing a peer advising program.
