

1. <u>East Central University</u> (page 23)

a. New Residence Hall (230-0052)

The following are informational items relating to the construction manager contract for the new residence hall that was previously approved at the April 7, 2016, Regional University System of Oklahoma board meeting. These items relate only to the utilization of contingency fund provisions of the contract and do not change the overall guaranteed maximum price of the contract of \$8,731,066.

Oakridge Builders – **Owner Contingency Utilization** – Value engineering items: wood credit, electrical re circuiting, grid and tile substitution, glazing revisions, window treatment substitutions, and add type "N" fixtures. Rebid of waterproofing / joint sealants, EIFS, and changes to utilities. – These items resulted in a change of (\$33,466.00).

The owner contingency was originally established at \$0.00 at inception of the project and is now at (\$33,466.00).

Oakridge Builders – Contractor Contingency Utilization – Builders risk overage and value engineering item remove dampers. Cast Stone masonry at the entry of the building. – These items resulted in a change of \$32,590.00.

The contractor contingency was originally established at \$207,976.00 at inception of the project and is now at \$175.386.00.

2. Southeastern Oklahoma State University (Pages 24)

a. Shearer Hall & Suites Fire Suppression System Repair

In accordance with Board policy 2.3.3, Purchases exceeding \$50,000 but not over \$150,000, Southeastern Oklahoma State University is reporting the following related to the repair of the Shearer Hall & Suites fire suppression system. The facility was stuck by lightning, shorting out significant portions of the fire alarm system. These repairs are covered in our advantage services contract with Seimens Industry Inc. Building Technologies Division. The building is owned by Southeastern Foundation, LLC and is insured — the University has a management agreement for the building with the Southeastern Foundation. The Foundation will reimburse the university for this expenditure under that management agreement.

3. Northwestern Oklahoma State University (page 25)

Project Description: Northwestern Oklahoma State University, with the assistance of Easley Associates Architects, Enid, Oklahoma, accepted a bid for electrical work in cooperation with OG&E to replace underground electrical lines and transformers in two locations on the Alva Campus. The bid was awarded to Moyer Electric, Woodward, Oklahoma.

Estimated net present value savings is \$98,323. The original bond proceeds were used to fund the equipment associated with the Johnson Controls International (JCI) Performance Contract Phase IV.





THIS AGREEMENT made this 29^{7h} day of <u>September</u>, 2017, between, <u>University of Central Oklahoma</u> whose address is 100 N. University Drive, <u>Edmond</u>, OK 73034 as Lessor (whether one or more), and Source Rock Production Interests, Corporation, whose address is P.O. Box 50885, Midland, TX 79710, Lessee; WITNESSETH:

1. Lessor, in consideration of 10.00 Dollars, and other valuable consideration, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, and of the covenants and agreements of Lessee hereinafter contained, does hereby grant, lease and let unto Lessee the land covered hereby for the purposes and with the exclusive right of exploring, drilling, mining and operating for, producing and owning oil, gas, sulphur and all other minerals (whether or not similar to those mentioned), together with the right to make surveys on said land, lay pipe lines, establish and utilize facilities for surface or subsurface disposal of salt water, construct roads and bridges, dig canals, build tanks, power stations, telephone lines, employee houses and other structures on said land, necessary or useful in Lessee's operations in exploring, drilling for, producing, treating, storing and transporting minerals produced from the land covered hereby or any other land adjacent thereto. The land covered hereby, herein called "said land," is located in the County of ___Lea__, State of _New Mexico_, and is described as follows:

Township 16 South, Range 34 East

The E/2 of Section 13

This lease also covers and includes, in addition to that above described, all land, if any, contiguous or adjacent to or adjoining the land above described and (a) owned or claimed by Lessor by limitation, prescription, possession, reversion or unrecorded instrument or (b) as to which Lessor has a preference right of acquisition. Lessor agrees to execute any supplemental instrument requested by Lessee for a more complete or accurate description of said land. For the purpose of determining the amount of any borns or other payment hereunder, said land shall be deemed to contain 320 acres, whether actually containing more or less, and the above recital of acreage in any tract shall be deemed to be the true acreage thereof. Lessor accepts the borns as lump sum consideration for this lease and all rights and options hereunder.

- 2. Subject Unless sooner terminated or longer kept in force under other provisions hereof, this lease shall remain in force for a term of 3 years from the date hereof, hereinafter called "primary term," and as long thereafter as operations, as hereinafter defined, are conducted upon said land with no cessation for more than ninety (90) consecutive days. Lessor herein retains the option to at its discretion to extend the lease for an additional 2 years.
- 3. As royalty, Lessee covenants and agrees: (a) To deliver to the credit of Lessor, in the pipe line to which Lessee may connect its wells, the equal Three-Sixteenths (3/16ths) part of all oil produced and saved by Lessee from said land, or from time to time, at the option of Lessee, to pay Lessor the average posted market price of such Three-Sixteenths (3/16ths) part of such oil at the wells as of the day it is run to the pipe line or storage tanks, Lessor's interest, in either case, to bear Three-Sixteenths (3/16ths) of the cost of treating oil to render it marketable pipe line oil; (b) To pay Lessor on gas and casinghead gas produced from said land (1) when sold by Lessee, Three-Sixteenths (3/16ths) of the amount realized by Lessee, computed at the mouth of the well, or (2) when used by Lessec off said land or in the maunfacture of gasoline or other products, the market value, at the mouth of the well, of Three-Sixteenths (3/16ths) of such gas and casinghead gas; (c) To pay Lessor on all other minerals mined and marketed or utilized by Lessee from said land, one-tenth either in kind or value at the well or mine at Lessee's election, except that on sulphur mined and marketed the royalty shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per long ton. If, at the expiration of the primary term or at any time or times thereafter, there is any well on said land or on lands with which said land or any portion thereof has been pooled, capable of producing oil or gas, and all such wells are shut-in, this lease shall, nevertheless, continue in force as though operations were being conducted on said land for so long as said wells are shut-in, and thereafter this lease may be continued in force as if no shut-in had occurred. Lessee covenants and agrees to use reasonable diligence to produce, utilize, or market the minerals capable of being produced from said wells, but in the exercise of such diligence, Lessee shall not be obligated to install or furnish facilities other than well facilities and ordinary lease facilities of flow lines, separator, and lease tank, and shall not be required to settle labor trouble or to market gas upon terms meacceptable to Lessee. If, at any time or times after the expiration of the primary term, all such wells are shut-in for a period of ninety consecutive days, and during such time there are no operations on said land, then at or before the expiration of said ninety day period, Lessee shall pay or tender, by check or draft of Lessee, as royalty, a sum equal to one dollar (\$1.00) for each acre of land then covered hereby. Lessee shall make like payments or tenders at or before the end of each anniversary of the expiration of said ninety day period if upon such anniversary this lease is being continued in force solely by reason of the provisions of this paragraph. Each such payment or tender shall be made to the parties who at the time of payment would be entitled to receive the royalties which would be paid under this lease if the wells were producing, and may be deposited in the:

or its successors, which shall continue as the depositories, regardless of changes in the ownership of shut-in royalty. If at any time that Lessee pays or tenders shut-in royalty, two or more parties are, or claim to be, entitled to receive same, Lessee may, in lieu of any other method of payment herein provided, pay or tender such shut-in royalty, in the manner above specified, either jointly to such parties or separately to each in accordance with their respective ownerships thereof, as Lessee may elect. payment hereunder may be made by check or draft of Lessee deposited in the mail or delivered to the party entities 18 payment or to a depository bank provided for above on or before the last date for payment. Nothing herein shall impair Lessee's right to release as provided in paragraph 5 hereof. In the event of assignment of this lease in whole or in part, liability for payment hereunder shall rest exclusively on the then owner or owners of this lease, severally as to acreage owned by each.

- Lessee is hereby granted the right, at its option, to pool or unitize any land covered by this lease with any other land covered by this lease, and/or with any other land, lease, or leases, as to any or all minerals or horizons, so as to establish units containing not more than 80 surface acres, plus 10% acreage tolerance; provided, however, units may be established as to any one or more horizons, or existing units may be enlarged as to any one or more horizons, so as to contain not more than 640 surface acres plus 10% acreage tolerance, if limited to one or more of the following: (1) gas, other than easinghead gas, (2) liquid hydrocarbons (condensate) which are not liquids in the subsurface reservoir, (3) minerals produced from wells classified as gas wells by the conservation agency having jurisdiction. If larger units than any of those herein permitted, either at the time established, or after enlargement, are required under any governmental rule or order, for the drilling or operation of a well at a regular location, or for obtaining maximum allowable from any well to be drilled, drilling, or already drilled, any such unit may be established or enlarged to conform to the size required by such governmental order or rule. Lessee shall exercise said option as to each desired unit by executing an instrument identifying such unit and filing it for record in the public office in which this lease is recorded. Each of said options may be exercised by Lessee at any time and from time to time while this lease is in force, and whether before or after production has been established either on said land, or on the portion of said land included in the unit, or on other land unitized therewith. A unit established hereunder shall be valid and effective for all purposes of this lease even though there may be mineral, royalty, or leasehold interests in lands within the unit which are not effectively pooled or unitized. Any operations conducted on any part of such unitized land shall be considered, for all purposes, except the payment of royalty, operations conducted upon said land under this lease. There shall be allocated to the land covered by this lease within each such unit (or to each separate tract within the unit if this lease covers separate tracts within the unit) that proportion of the total production of unitized minerals from the unit, after deducting any used in lease or unit operations, which the number of surface acres in such land (or in each such separate tract) covered by this lease within the unit bears to the total number of surface acres in the unit, and the production so allocated shall be considered for all purposes, including payment or delivery of royalty, overriding royalty and any other payments out of production, to be the entire production of unitized minerals from the land to which allocated in the same manuer as though produced therefrom under the terms of this lease. The owner of the reversionary estate of any term royalty or mineral estate agrees that the accrual of royaltics pursuant to this paragraph or of shut-in royalties from a well on the unit shall satisfy any limitation of term requiring production of oil or gas. The formation of any unit hereunder which includes land not covered by this lease shall not have the effect of exchanging or transferring any interest under this lease (including, without limitation, any shut-in royalty which may become payable under this lease) between parties owning interests in land covered by this lease and parties owning interests in land not covered by this lease. Neither shall it impair the right of Lessec to release as provided in paragraph 5 hereof, except that Lessec may not so release as to lands within a unit while there are operations thereon for unitized minerals noless all pooled leases are released as to lands within the unit. At any time while this lease is in force Lessee may dissolve any unit established hereunder by filing for record in the public office where this lease is recorded a declaration to that effect, if at that time no operations are being conducted thereon for unitized minerals. Subject to the provisions of this paragraph 4, a unit once established hereunder shall remain in force so long as any lease subject thereto shall remain in force. If this lease now or hereafter covers separate tracts, no pooling or unitization of royalty interests as between any such separate tracts is intended or shall be implied or result merely from the inclusion of such separate tracts within this lease but Lessee shall nevertheless have the right to pool or unitize as provided in this paragraph 4 with consequent allocation of production as herein provided. As used in this paragraph 4, the words "separate tract" mean any tract with royalty ownership differing, now or hereafter, either as to parties or amounts, from that as to any other part of the leased premises.
- Lessee may at any time and from time to time execute and deliver to Lessor or file for record a release or releases of this lesse
 as to any part or all of said land or of any mineral or horizon thereunder, and thereby be relieved of all obligations, as to the
 released acreage or interest.
- 6. Whenever used in this lease the word "operations" shall mean operations for and any of the following: drilling, testing, completing, reworking, recompleting, deepening, plugging back or repairing of a well in search for or in an endeavor to obtain production of oil, gas, sulphur or other minerals, excavating a mine, production of oil, gas, sulphur or other mineral, whether or not in paying quantities.
- 7. Lessee shall have the use, free from royalty, of water, other than from Lessor's water wells, and of oil and gas produced from said land in all operations hereunder. Lessee shall have the right at any time to remove all machinery and fixtures placed on said land, including the right to draw and remove casing. No well shall be drilled nearer than 200 feet to the house or barn now on said land without the consent of the Lessor. Lessee shall pay for damages caused by its operations to growing crops and timber on said land.
- 8. The rights and estate of any party hereto may be assigned from time to time in whole or in part and as to any mineral or horizon. All of the covenants, obligations, and considerations of this lease shall extend to and be binding upon the parties bereto, their heirs, successors, assigns, and successive assigns. No change or division in the ownership of said land, royalties, or other moneys, or any part thereof, howsoever effected, shall increase the obligations or diminish the rights of Lessee, including, but not limited to, the location and drilling of wells and the measurement of production. Notwithstanding any other actual or constructive knowledge or notice thereof of or to Lessee, its successors or assigns, no change or division in the ownership of said land or of the royalties, or other moneys, or the right to receive the same, howsoever effected, shall be binding upon the then record owner of this lease until thirty (30) days after there has been furnished to such record owner at his or its principal place of business by Lessor or Lessor's heirs, successors, or assigns, notice of such change or division, supported by either originals or duly certified copies of the instruments which have been properly filed for record and which evidence such change or division, and of such court records and proceedings, transcripts, or other documents as shall be necessary in the opinion of such record owner to establish the validity of such change or division. If any such change in ownership occurs by reason of the death of the owner, Lessee may, nevertheless pay or tender such royalties, or other moneys, or part thereof, to the credit of the decedent in a depository bank provided for above.

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- 9. In the event Lesser considers that Lessee has not complied with all its obligations hereunder, both express and impred, Lesser shall notify Lessee in writing, setting out specifically in what respects Lessee has breached this contract. Lessee shall then have sixty (60) days after receipt of said notice within which to meet or commence to meet all or any part of the breaches alleged by Lessor. The service of said notice shall be precedent to the bringing of any action by Lessor on said lease for any cause, and no such action shall be brought until the lapse of sixty (60) days after service of such notice on Lessee. Neither the service of said notice nor the doing of any acts by Lessee aimed to meet all or any of the alleged breaches shall be deemed an admission or presumption that Lessee has failed to perform all its obligations hereunder. If this lease is canceled for any cause, it shall nevertheless remain in force and effect as to (1) sufficient acreage around each well as to which there are operations to constitute a drilling or maximum allowable unit mader applicable governmental regulations, (but in no event less that forty acres), such acreage to be designated by Lessee as nearly as practicable in the form of a square centered at the well, or in such shape as then existing spacing rules require; and (2) any part of said land included in a pooled unit on which there are operations. Lessee shall also have such casements on said land as are necessary to operations on the acreage so retained.
- 10. Lessor hereby warrants and agrees to defend title to said land against the claims of all persons whomsoever. Lessor's rights and interests hereinder shall be charged primarily with any mortgages, taxes or other liens, or interest and other charges on said land, but Lessor agrees that Lessee shall have the right at any time to pay or reduce same for Lessor, either before or after maturity, and be subrogated to the rights of the holder thereof and to deduct amounts so paid from royalties or other payments payable or which may become payable to Lessor and/or assigns under this lease. If this lease covers a less interest in the oil, gas, sulphur, or other minerals in all or any part of said land than the entire and undivided fee simple estate (whether Lessor's interest is herein specified or not), or no interest therein, then the royalties and other moneys accruing from any part as to which this lease covers less than such full interest, shall be paid only in the proportion which the interest therein, if any, covered by this lease, bears in the whole and undivided fee simple estate therein. All royalty interest covered by this lease (whether or not owned by Lessor) shall be paid out of the royalty herein provided. This lease shall be binding upon each party who executes it without regard to whether it is executed by all those named herein as Lessor.
- 11. If, while this lease is in force, at, or after the expiration of the primary term hereof, it is not being continued in force by reason of the shut-in well provisions of paragraph 3 hereof, and Lessee is not conducting operations on said land by reason of (1) any law, order, rule or regulation, (whether or not subsequently determined to be invalid) or (2) any other cause, whether similar or dissimilar, (except financial) beyond the reasonable control of Lessee, expressly including Lessee's inability to obtain materials or services, including but not limited to fracture stimulation services, the primary term hereof shall he extended until the first anniversary date hereof occurring ninety (90) or more days following the removal of such delaying cause, and this lease may be extended thereafter by operations as if such delay had not occurred.
- 12. Not withstanding anything herein contained to the contrary, if at the expiration of the primary term of this lease, this lease has not been, or is not being extended pursuant to any of its provisions, then Lessee, its successors or assigns shall have the option to extend the primary term of this lease, as to all or any portion of the lands covered hereby, for an additional Two year(s) by paying the sum of money as was originally paid for the lease per net mineral acre to Lessor. Said payment or tender shall be made on or hefore the expiration date of the initial primary term and shall be considered to include the prepaid delay rental. If Lessee extends this lease as herein provided, it shall be considered that the primary term is five years.

PAID UP OIL, GAS & MINERAL LEASE

THIS LEASE AGREEMENT is made effective the 24th day of October, 2017 (the "effective date"), between University of Central Oklahoma, as Lessor (whether one or more), whose address is 100 North University, Campus Box 178, Edmond, Oklahoma 73034, and Deerwood Exploration, LLC, as Lessee, whose address is 1403 Foulk Road, Suite 2200, Room 550 Wilmington, Delaware 19803.

1. <u>Description</u>. Lessor, in consideration of Ten and No/100 Dollars (\$10.00), in hand paid, of the royalties herein provided and the covenants herein contained, hereby grants, leases and lets exclusively to Lessee, for the purpose of exploring for, geophysically or by other means, developing, producing and marketing oil and gas of any nature or kind, along with all hydrocarbon and non-hydrocarbon substances, whether liquid or gasaous, produced in association therewith including sulphur, helium, nitrogen, carbon dioxide and other commercial gases as well as hydrocarbon gases (collectively referred to herein as "covered minerals"), and marketing or rendering more marketable or more valuable covered minerals, including without limitation laying pipalines for gathering and/or transportation and construction of treating, separating, dehydration, processing or other facilities and grants the right to inject water or other produced liquids into non-freshwater bearing formations underlying the leased premises, the following describad land (the "leased premises") in Lea, County, New Mexico, to-wit:

This lease also covers accretions and any small strips or parcels of land now or hereafter acquired or claimed by Lessor which are contiguous or adjacent to the leased premises whether or not such parcels are known to exist by Lassor or Lessee, and for the aforementioned consideration, Lessor agrees to execute at Lessae's request any additional or supplemental instruments for a more complete or accurate description of the land so covared. For the purpose of determining the amount of any shut-in royalties hereunder, said land shall be deemed to be comprised of 160.00 acres, whether it actually comprises more or less.

- 2. <u>Tarm of Lease</u>. This lease shall be in force for a primary term of three (3) years from the effective date of this lease, and for as long thereafter as either: (a) any covered minerals are being produced from the leased premises or lands pooled, unitized or otherwise combined therewith; or (b) Operations, as hereinafter defined, are being conducted upon the leased premises or lends pooled, unitized or otherwise combined therewith with no cessation of more than ninety (90) consecutive days; or (c) this lease is otherwise meintained in effect pursuant to the provisions hereof. Lessor hereby grants Lessee the option to extend the primary term of this lease for an additional two (2) years from the expiration of the original primary term hereof as to all or any portion of the leased premises then held hereunder which would expire unless so extended. A proportionate share of or costs incurred by Lessee in gathering, taxting debuttering and production compositions are received. treating, dehydrating, compressing, processing, transporting or delivering such production, and any other costs of marketing or rendering marketable or more valuable the covered minerals, whether on the leased premises or off the leased premises may also be deducted in calculating royalties payable hereunder. (d) If, at the expiration of the primary term or at any time or times thereafter, there is any well on the leased premises or on lands pooled therewith, capable of producing covered minerals, and all such wells are shut-in, this lease shall, nevertheless, continue in force as though Operations were being conducted on said land for so long as said wells are shut-in, and thereafter this tease may be continued in force as if no shut-in had occurred. Lessee covenants and agrees to use reasonable diligence to produce, utilize, or market the minerals capable of being produced from said wells, but in the exercise of such diligence, Lessee shall not be obligated to install or furnish facilities other than well facilities and ordinary lease facilities, flow lines, separator, and lease tank, and shall not be required to market such covered minerals upon terms unacceptable to Lessee. - 6. Anciliary Rights, in exploring for, developing, producing and marketing covered minerals, in primary or enhanced recovery, Lessor hereby grants and conveys to Lessee the free right of ingress and egress atong with the right to conduct Operations on the leased premises as may be reasonably necessary for such purposes, including but not finited to geophysical operations and any other Operations on the leased premises, lands pooled or unitized therewith or lands adjacent thereto, and the construction and use of roads, canals, pipelines, lanks, water walls, disposal wells, injection wells, pits, etectric and telaphona lines, power stations, and other facilities deemed necessary by Lessee to discover, produce, store, treat, and transport production in connection with said wells, in connection with Lessee's Operations, Lessee's ancillary rights granted berein shall epply to both surface and subsurface of: (a) the entire leased premises described in paragraph 1 above, notwithstanding any partial release or other partial termination of this lease; (b) all lands pooled or unitized with the leased premises; and (c) any other lands contiguous or adjacent to the leased premises described in paragraph 1 above, notwithstanding any partial release or other padial termination of this lease, in which Lessor now or hereafter has authority to grant such rights. Such encitlary rights include, but are not limited to, the right to use the subsurface of the leased premises in connection with a well to be driffed under but boltomed off the leased premises. No surface location for a well shall be located less than two hundred (200) feet from any house or barn now on the leased premises or other lands used by Lessee hereunder without Lessor's consoni. In addition to the ancillary rights described above, Lessee shall have the right at any time to remove its fixtures, equipment and meterials, including well casing, from the leased premises or such other lands during the term of this lease or within one (1) year following the expiration thereof.
- 7. Ownership Changes. The interest of either Lessor or Lessee hereunder may be assigned, devised or otherwise transferred in whole or in part, by area or by depth or zone, and the rights and obligations of the parties hereunder shall extend to their respective heirs, devisees, executors, administrators, successors and assigns. No change in Lessor's ownership shall have the effect of reducing the rights or enterging the obligations of Lessee hereunder, and no change in ownership shall be blinding on Lessee until sixty (60) days after Lessee has been furnished the original or certified or duly enthenlicated copies of the documents establishing such change of ownership to the satisfaction of Lesses. In the event of the deeth of any person entitled to shull-in royalites hereunder, Lesses may pay or lender such shut-in royalties to the credit of decedent or decedent's estate. If at any time two or more persons are entitled to shut-in royalties hereunder, Lessee may pay or tender such shut-in royalties to such persons, either jointly or seperately, in proportion to the interest which each owns. If Lessee transfers its interest hereunder in whole or in part, Lessee shall be relieved of all obligations thereafter arising with respect to the transferred interest, and failure of the transferree to satisfy such obligations with respect to the transferred interest shall not affect the rights of Lessea with respect to any interest not so transferred. - 8. Warranty of Title. Lessor hereby warrants and agrees to defend little to the interest conveyed to Lessee hereunder. Lessee, at its option, may pay or discharge any tax, mortgage or lien existing, levied or assessed against the leased premises and, in the event that it does so, Lessee shall be subrogated to the rights of the party to whom payment is made end, in addition to its other rights, may reimburse itself out of any royalities or shut in royalities otherwise payable to Lessor hereunder. In the event Lessee is made aware of any cleim inconsistent with Lessor's title. Lessee may suspend the payment of royalties or shut-in royalties hereunder, without interest, until Lessee has been furnished satisfactory evidence that such claim has been resolved.
- 9. <u>Payment Reductions</u>. If Lessor owns less then the full mineral estate in all or any part of the leased premises, payment of royalties and shut in royalties hereunder shall be reduced proportionately to the amount that Lessor's interest in the leased premises bears to the entire mineral estate in the leased premises. To the extent any royalty or other payment attributable to the mineral interest covered by this lease is payable to someone other than Lessor, such royalty or other payment shall be daducted from the corresponding amount otherwise payable to Lessor hereunder.

If Lessee releases all or an undivided interest in less than all of the area covered hereby, Lessee's obligation to pay or tender shut-in royellies shall be proportionately reduced in accordance with the net acreage interest retained hereunder.

I PERSONNEL

A. FACULTY APPOINTMENTS

John Massey School of Business

B. Sabbatical Leave

Dr. Lawrence Silver, Professor and John Massey Chair in Marketing, has requested sabbatical leave for the Spring 2018 term. Dr. Silver will take the lead in writing two textbooks designed for an accelerated delivery format. He will collaborate with two other faculty members in the John Massey School of Business to develop one textbook in marketing management and one in strategic management. 

The recommendations of East Central University are as follows:

I. PERSONNEL

A. FACULTY APPOINTMENTS

MR. WILL BOGGS has been appointed to a one-year, non-tenure track appointment as Instructor of Mass Communication for the 2017 – 2018 academic year. Mr. Boggs will fill the vacancy left by Samantha Dilleha, who passed away on September 28, 2017. His academic year salary will be \$38,000.

Mr. Boggs holds a Master of Fine Arts in Film from the University of Oklahoma (1998) and a Bachelor of Arts from East Central University (1993). He is a noted documentary film maker who has been honored with a Regional Emmy Award for Documentary Film. His films have been shown at regional and national film festivals and have been broadcast regionally and nationally via PBS.

B. APPROVAL TO HIRE VICE PRESIDENT

VICE PRESIDENT FOR INSTITUTIONAL ADVANCEMENT – In accordance with Board policy, we recommend employment of Ms. Amy Ford for the Vice President for Institutional Advancement. The position will be a new administrative position responsible for overseeing marketing & communication, strategic planning, event planning, alumni affairs, and advancement. The position is needed to assist the president in developing relationships with alumni and external constituencies. The position will be funded at an annual salary of \$105,000 from E & G, Part I monies. While this is a new Vice President's position, Ms. Ford formally held the position of Assistant Vice President for Marketing and Communications at an annual salary of \$74,490. Therefore, the only new funds needed for this position are \$30,510. The position will begin January 1, 2018, and a budget revision will be presented to the Audit and Finance Committee to amend the FY2018 budget for half a year's increase in salary (\$15,255) plus benefits.

C. APPROVAL FOR STIPENDS

East Central University requests approval to provide a stipend with the November 2017 payroll for full-time, benefits-eligible employees employed as of November 1, 2016. The stipend will be \$500. A budget revision will be presented to the Audit and Finance Committee.

Total Cost: \$221,144

Source of Funds: Depending on the budget from which the employee is paid.

II. GRANTS AND CONTRACTS

East Central University received a \$290,490 grant from the US Department of Education. The project period: September 1, 2017 to August 31, 2018.
